#### Mental Health Checkups for Youth— Ohio Garrett Lee Smith Grant Highlights

- For Federal Fiscal Years 2007 and 2008, \$427,540 was awarded to communities across Ohio to invest in Mental Health Checkup Program site development. The goal for calendar year 2009 is to offer 5,300 mental health checkups to Ohio's youth.
- Ohio currently has 117 Mental Health Checkup sites, including Columbia University's TeenScreen Program, Mental Health America's Signs of Suicide Program, and Red Flags.
- Mental Health Checkup Program Results:\*
  - Ohio has offered screening to 28,680 youth; 9,307 youth received consent to be screened.
  - 7,997 youth have been screened.
  - 24% screened positive.
  - 76% screened negative.
  - 2,074 youth received a clinical interview.\*\*
  - 63%, or 1,316, youth received a referral after the clinical interview.
  - 91% of the youth referred were referred for a full mental health assessment.
  - 26 youth have been referred for emergency care due to being actively suicidal.
  - 711, or 54%, of youth attended at least one appointment.
  - \* Includes total results from years 1 and 2 of Ohio's Garrett Lee Smith Youth Suicide Prevention Grant.
  - \*\*\* Number larger than positive number due to some youths' receiving a clinical interview after debriefing because they asked for one or the debriefer deemed a clinical interview was necessary.

To promote suicide prevention as a public health issue and advance evidence-based awareness, intervention, and methodology strategies that support all Ohio-based suicide prevention efforts.


#### **Vision**

#### 2008/2009 Areas of Focus



State Fiscal Years 2008/2009 were exciting and energizing times for OSPF with continued efforts to expand and develop collaborative partnerships with county suicide prevention coalitions; the Ohio Departments of Mental Health, Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services, and Education; The Ohio State University; Columbia University; the Ohio Supreme Court; and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), as well as other national and community organizations.


A statewide education and awareness campaign concentrated on reaching as many Ohioans as possible through public service announcements; dissemination of the OSPF brochure, which explains the mission of the foundation and Ohio's suicide prevention efforts; and reinvigorating the OSPF web site: **ohiospf.org**. Several features of the site include county data, a calendar of events, resources/articles, national and state organizational web links, and the OSPF *Strategic Plan* and priorities for the next three years.

OSPF is especially grateful for the new collaborative partnership with The Ohio State University's College of Social Work. The foundation is now headquartered in the college, located in the heart of central campus in Stillman Hall.

### OSPF Programming County Coalitions 2008/2009 Highlights


- In State Fiscal Years (SFY) 2008/2009, the Ohio Suicide Prevention Foundation funded 14
  new suicide prevention coalitions and provided matching funds to 13 coalitions established
  in SFY 2007 and 2008, bringing the total to 69 coalitions serving 73 counties across Ohio.
- As of the end of SFY 2009, there has been an investment of \$344,603 in county coalition development.
- Additionally, the foundation provided \$1,000 mini-grants to 41 county coalitions to sustain and enhance their suicide prevention work.
- Through funding from the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and the Ohio Department of Mental Health, OSPF and the Drug Free Action Alliance provided five regional summits on suicide/substance abuse prevention. OSPF awarded 46 \$1,000 mini-grants for collaborative projects between suicide prevention and alcohol and drug prevention coalitions.
- Ellen Anderson, PhD, provided OSPF's annual Gatekeeper Training for trainers and technical assistance to the 14 new coalitions.
- OSPF offered dynamic statewide conferences in SFY 2008/2009.
  - In November 2007, the foundation held the Fourth Annual Suicide Prevention Conference for Coalitions, with 140 people in attendance. James Rogers, PhD and president-elect of the American Association of Suicidology, provided the plenary remarks.
  - In June 2008, the foundation held the first statewide conference for survivors of suicide loss. John Jordan, PhD, a nationally recognized expert in suicide grief resolution, presented the plenary address and afternoon support session. The conference was well received with over 100 participants in attendance.
  - On December 3, 2008, OSPF held the Fifth Annual Suicide Prevention Conference for Coalitions featuring keynote presentations by Rheeda Walker, PhD, author of Suicide Risk and Protective Factors Among African Americans, and Joseph Hovey, PhD, author of Stress, Coping and Suicide Risk in Immigrant and Ethnic Communities.
  - On April 25, 2009, OSPF had the opportunity to co-sponsor the Survivors of Suicide Loss Conference with

the Suicide Prevention Education Alliance of Cleveland, Ohio. John Jordan, PhD, was invited back for a second year to present the keynote address to over 100 participants regarding *Grieving After Suicide: The Journey of Survivors*.

- The OSPF web site was renovated, now featuring several benefits for Ohioans, including:
  - an interactive map of county coalition efforts
  - information on the Youth Risk Assessment Project, including SOS and TeenScreen programming
  - county hotline numbers
  - a calendar of upcoming events across Ohio
  - public service announcements
  - web-based resources

- The foundation completed three 30-second public service announcements that will be used to continue to educate Ohioans regarding suicide prevention.
- In collaboration with the Ohio Department of Education, the foundation developed a Safety and Violence Prevention Curriculum to be used as a training tool for Ohio school professionals (teachers, nurses, school counselors, etc.). The curriculum covers depression, suicide prevention, alcohol and drug use/abuse, bullying and violence, and child abuse.
- OSPF presented workshops on suicide prevention at the Annual American Association of Suicidology Conference in Boston, the PRIDE Conference in Cincinnati, Pathways Clubhouse in Columbus, and the Portsmouth Health Fair.
