About the Summit...

Drug Summit, the Mahoning County ADAS Board will be convening the First Annual Northeast Ohio Regional Drug Summit. This Summit represents an effort to bring together community stakeholders from all of Northeast Ohio to reduce substance abuse related problems. The Mahoning County ADAS Board hopes to build this into an annual event that will bring together professionals and community leaders from the entire region to network and share information on innovative and effective programming and best practices in the field.

OBJECTIVES:

- Promote an effective and efficient ATOD treatment and prevention system that provides for greater consistency and coordination of resources.
- Provide high quality, local professional development for ATOD treatment and prevention professionals, facilitating their certification needs.
- Provide opportunities for networking across multiple systems invested in the delivery of quality ATOD treatment and prevention services.
- Develop an annual regional conference that meets the needs of a broad base of constituents working in the ATOD field.

BREAKOUT TRACKS: This years Summit will again feature speakers and breakout sessions arranged in four "tracks": Prevention, Treatment, Legal/Law Enforcement and Schools/Education. The new expanded 2-day format will allow participants to attend sessions geared to everyone from the beginner to the seasoned professional. A wide variety of topics will be available to meet the needs of professionals who are acquiring or renewing certificates or licenses. As travel to Columbus for professional development becomes more costly, local opportunities for networking and professional growth will allow us to develop and implement high quality services for our region.

Judge Theresa Dellick

Keynote Presentation: Optical Illusions

When dealing with youth, what you see is not what you get. Learn how to listen with all of your senses.

About the presenter...

Theresa Dellick entered private practice after graduation from law school in 1983, became a partner in a Youngstown law firm and worked as a civil trial lawyer. In 1999, she became a county court judge with jurisdiction in Boardman, Austintown, Canfield and Sebring, and launched the misdemeanor drug court, which remains operational to date. In 2001, she became presiding and Administrative Judge for the Mahoning County Juvenile Court Judge.

Her administration of the juvenile court has been directed to balanced and restorative justice, and is focused on youth accountability and responsibility as well as preserving victims' rights. Judge Dellick believes that mental health and substance abuse issues are interrelated, and created a Treatment Court that blends the two elements for rehabilitation. She has launched many programs, including the Family Dependency Court, Day Reporting Program, Education Court, Truancy Court, DYS-Reentry Court, Mediation, a Counseling Department, a Jackson-Milton/Craig Beach/JJC Summer Camp, a Comprehensive Sports Program, Parent Project, KIND, Teen Court, and an ADHD program. The programs provide specific treatment and sanctions for the various court cases. They are strength-based and focus on assisting the family to become self-reliant. The programs have received state recognition for their effectiveness and serve as a model to other courts.

Under her direction, the Juvenile Detention Center has received accreditation from the American Corrections Association, and is only one of six in the State of Ohio to have received this certification. Judge Dellick has brought evidence based programs to Mahoning County that address juvenile rehabilitation. She has taken an active role in building collaborations between juvenile court, school districts, social service agencies and law enforcement.

TH-1—Urine Trouble—90 minutes

Angie Giltner, LSW, LCDC III—Coordinator of Intervention Services, Your Human Resource Center

Participants can expect to learn about the wonderful world of urine drug testing, including false positives, adulterants, basic rules of thumb, drug interactions, myth busting, and courtroom testimony. Come, laugh, and learn everything you ever wanted to know about urine! Tracks P, T; Level I

TH-2—Specialty Docket Courts: Therapeutic Alternatives—90 minutes

Specialty Docket Courts can offer therapeutic interventions in lieu of prison, detention or other options that contribute to family disintegration. Hearing from direct line staff in these courts, participants will hear about the challenges and successes we see in the specialty docket programs. Track L; Levels B/I

TH-3—Tobacco Treatment—Exploring Best Practices—90 minutes

Danna Bozick, LSW, NCC, OCPSII, LICDC—Tobacco Treatment Specialist, HMHP Regional Tobacco Treatment Center

This workshop will explore the treatment of tobacco use and dependence based upon best practices outlined in the Public Health Service Guideline 2008 Update. It will examine the treatment of nicotine dependence through various interventions, including pharmacotherapy and behavioral counseling. Track T, Level B

TH-4—Drug Associated Deaths in Trumbull County—A 5 Year Retrospective—90 minutes

Dr. Humphrey D. Germaniuk, M.D., Trumbull County Medical Examiner and Coroner

Dr. Germaniuk will be discussing the changing paradigm—from street drug use to prescription medications, and will describe new and emerging trends. Although the statistics represent Trumbull County, the information is relevant throughout the area. Tracks E, P, T, L, F; Level B

TH-5—The Mahoning County Bar Association Lawyers Assistance Committee—90 minutes

Attorney Linda Martin Saunders

Attorney Saunders will facilitate a panel of attorneys. The M.C.B.A.L.A.C. is the arm of the Bar Association to assist lawyers and their staff/families dealing with Alcohol & Other Drug (A.O.D.) issues as well as mental health issues. Members execute a confidentiality agreement and are exempt from Bar Rules in revealing attorney misconduct or criminal acts. Tracks T, L; Level B

TH-6—Understanding Alcohol and Other Drug Dependency—90 minutes

Jerry Carter, LPCC-S, LICDC, Executive Director, Neil Kennedy Recovery Clinic

This workshop provides a brief introduction to the nature and symptoms of alcohol and other drug dependency. Workshop participants will learn the difference between use, abuse and dependency and will be introduced to the basic diagnostic and descriptive symptoms of this chronic illness. TH-7—Drug Court Handbooks and Tracking—3 hours—This is a double session and goes until 4:00 p.m.

Judge Theresa Dellick, Mahoning County Juvenile Court

This workshop will assist participants in the understanding and development of a therapeutic juvenile drug court utilizing strength and evidenced base practices. A broad continuum of crucial elements to consider when working with youth in a positive and pro-social context will be explored as well as rewards and sanctions. A special emphasis specifically working with females in the judicial system will also be explored. Participants will receive a template handbook for the four phase program expansion and review the evolution of this dynamic and fluid, multi faceted program. Tracks L, T; Levels B/I

TH-8—Trauma 101—3 hours—This is a double session and goes until 4:00 p.m.

Jamie Marich, Ph.D., LPCC-S, LICDC

Proper study of trauma not only enhances our clinical practices, but it helps us to better understand the addiction cycle. In this workshop, counselors will be exposed to criteria for the PTSD diagnosis and to alternative hypotheses for understanding trauma. Participants will be able to recognize various degrees of trauma when they see it in clinical presentation and formulate the best treatment plan possible for an addicted client presenting with trauma. This workshop examines some important factors that every counselor needs to know about trauma when it comes to diagnosis and treatment planning. Tracks P, T; Level I

Many professionals do not know that many popular brands of energy drinks contain alcohol. This is a growing trend with adolescents and is a great concern because of the danger of mixing a depressant and a stimulant. Many of these drinks are marketed and packaged like their non-alcoholic versions, so a professional may not even know that they are being consumed in front of them. These drinks are being targeted towards youth and are being utilized in schools because they appear so similar to popular energy drinks. Tracks P, L, E; Level B

A Panel of Licking County High School Youth

Many youth based prevention programs plan *for* youth instead of *with* youth. Youth to Youth operates on a policy that the young people in the program plan, coordinate and execute activities, community service projects, and drug-free alternatives from beginning to end with the assistance and support of program staff and adult volunteers. In this workshop, participants will better understand how the "youth as leaders" process works and how to use it to re-integrate youth in their youth based prevention programming. F-5—Alcohol, Tobacco and Street Drug Use by Pregnant Women—90 minutes

Pam Nock, LICDC, CPS I., Tobacco Treatment Specialist/Clinical Coord., HMHP Regional Tobacco Treatment Center
